High-Level Week in New York City

"High-Level Week" refers to the special gatherings at the United Nations that bring together world leaders. "UNGA80" refers to the 80th meeting of the United Nations General Assembly. What happened in New York City last month was the most significant High-Level Week on the UN calendar all year and that was the General Debate at UNGA80.

Representatives of UN-accredited Non-Governmental Organizations, or NGOs, usually have relatively easy access to the United Nations facilities, but not so much during High-Level Week, when security was very tight. At the same time, however, across the city, NGOs met and discussed a range of issues relevant to the United Nations and the state of the world. Climate change and the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) were particularly prominent topics. (For more information on the SDGs, click here).

Among the events that I attended while in NYC was the all-day *SDGs Conference 2025: In the Margins of the UNGA80*, which was organized by the Journalists and Writers Foundation and cosponsored by 56 NGOs from 30 countries.

I think the general feeling at this event regarding the state of the world was captured by words of Antonio Gramsci (1891-1937) that were shared by one of the speakers (and are probably more relevant today than when first written): "The crisis consists precisely in the fact that the old is dying and the new cannot be born; in this interregnum a great variety of morbid symptoms appear."

There was an optimism that social, political and environmental progress will ultimately continue, as we so desperately need. That the "arc of the moral universe is long, but it bends toward justice" (MLK). However, that bend is painfully long and frustrating. Meanwhile, we will keep experiencing some very *morbid symptoms*, including political decay, corruption and war. In many ways, we need to brace ourselves to the fact that things may get much worse in terms of justice and sustainable development. Democracy itself is receding around the world!

What we need, according to presenters at the conference, is first, a commitment to the development of an informed citizenry. This means aggressively addressing the misinformation and disinformation that is now rampant. And second, we need to commit ourselves to working together in coalitions to support each other and further our collective goals of promoting sustainable development, social justice and peace.

"I hope through my assignment as the vice prior general I can foster the supportive cooperation among the entities of the Order and dedicate myself more to the building of just and peaceful world," reflected Fr Hariawan.
